## WHAT'S LAND GOT TO DO WITH IT!?

A Checklist for Advocating for Urban Agriculture in Zoning Ordinances

Improving food access in our communities takes community cooperation, time, and a little elbow grease. While not exhaustive, the following checklist is meant to serve as a starting place for you to begin advocating for planning and zoning policies that respect the intrinsic relationship between the food, land, and the people.

KNOW THE TURF		
	I know how many people live in my county or municipality. I know the median household income in my community. I know the what my property (or property of interest) is zoned as. I know which uses the zone that my property (or property of interest) allows.	
KNO	OW THE PLAYERS	
	I know my county or municipal elected representative. I know when my county or municipal elected body meets. I know my county or municipal executive/manager/administrator. I know who sits on my county or municipal Planning Board/Commission. I know when my county or municipal planning board/commission meets.	
KNO	KNOW THE CODE	
	My county or municipal government has established a community vision, plan, or policy for food system and food access.	
	Urban agriculture, including urban farms and urban gardens are legally permitted in my county or municipal zoning ordinance.	
	My community has a mechanism to measure health in land use policies or zoning codes. This can be done through a comprehensive scorecard, health impact assessment, or health in all policies approach.	
	My county or municipal government allows urban gardens or farms by right.	
	My State or County government provides tax credits or incentives for properties in agricultural zones.  My county or municipality is planning to update or rewrite the zoning ordinance.	
KNOW THE TOOLS		
	My county or municipality has a digital zoning map or where I can view the zoning in my community.  My county or municipality has a development activity notification email/website where I can be learn about new or updated development projects.	
	My community has a citizen's zoning academy where I can learn more about the planning and zoning process.  My county, municipal government, or community has a food equity council or food policy council.
